Lessons from Torah 59 - Exodus 4:18-12:43 Heart Disease

- Egypt suffered because Pharaoh 'hardened his heart' and wouldn't let Israel go, but God states that He – God – hardened Pharaoh's heart
- 2. This raises many questions:
 - a. What IS a hard heart?
 - b. Where do hard hearts come from?
 - c. Can 'believers' have hard hearts?
 - d. What can be done about hard hearts?
 - e. Can a heart be hard toward God yet soft too?
- 3. What IS a hard heart?
 - a. Hard toward God
 - i. Impulsive Proverbs 28:14
 - ii. Unresponsive Isaiah 6:9-10
 - iii. Unwilling to listen Ezekiel 3:7
 - iv. Disobedient Zechariah 7:12
 - v. Dense Mark 6:52, 8:17, 16:14
 - b. Hard toward neighbor:
 - i. Insensitive Deuteronomy 15:7
 - ii. False piety Mark 3:1-6
- 4. Where do hard hearts come from?
 - a. It is our natural condition, inherited from Adam
 - b. Once hardened, hearts remain hard; compare 8:15, 32 ("Pharaoh hardened his heart") and 8:19, 9:12 ("his heart remained hard")
 - c. Ourselves Exodus 8:15, 32; 9:34
 - d. God Exodus 4:21; 7:3; 9:12; 10:20, 27; 11:10; 14:4, 8, 17; Romans 9:18
 - e. Satan blinds the minds of unbelievers, preventing the Word of God from softening their hearts - 2 Corinthians 4:4
 - f. Sin's deception Hebrews 3:13
 - g. God will sometimes allow a heart to remain hard, or prevent it from softening, in order to accomplish His purpose through them
 - i. Exodus 9:16, 10:1, 14:17-18
 - ii. Acts 2:23, 4:27-28; Romans 11:25
- 5. Hard yet soft –

- a. Hard toward God, 'soft' toward neighbor: tax collectors
- b. Hard toward neighbor, 'soft' toward God: Pharisees
- c. To be properly soft-hearted both toward God AND neighbor takes the hand of God our example is Jesus
- 6. Who is responsible when our hearts are hard toward God?
 - a. We must answer for what we do and are, regardless of the reasons for our thoughts and actions - Romans 1:20, 2:1-2, 3:19; 1 Corinthians 1:29
 - b. Only by placing everyone's thoughts and actions our 'works' under condemnation can God save any through faith Galatians 3:10, 22-23; 1 John 5:11-13
 - c. But if God can heal our hardness and chooses not to, why are we held to blame for having hard hearts? Paul deals with this question in Romans 9:14-24
- 7. What can be done about hard hearts?
 - a. God alone can cure our hard hearts, by removing our hard heart and replacing it with a heart responsive to Him Ezekiel 36:26, 1 John 5:11-15; He uses:
 - i. The Word
 - ii. The testimony of believers
 - iii. The deeds of believers
 - iv. The result of evil
 - b. Humble repentance and seeking God's grace show God is already at work softening our hearts
- 8. Can even a 'believer' have a hard heart?
 - a. The testimony of the disciples Mark 6:52, 8:17, 16:14
 - b. Simon the Magician Acts 8:9-24
 - i. He 'believed', yet his later actions betrayed a heart beginning to harden toward God again
 - ii. Repentance was the cure he needed
- 9. Humility is evidence of a soft, responsive heart Matt 11:29
 - a. When other things become more valuable to us that Jesus Christ, our hearts begin again to harden toward God – Hebrews 3:12-19
 - b. This is why He gives us His Word John 8:31-32
 - c. We need the encouragement and accountability offered by God through other believers Hebrews 3:13
- 10. Humility and repentance not one-time events but part of our daily walk with God John 13:8-10
